About the Performers

The Soloists

Jerry Sams has done considerable solo work in the Seattle area with both the Seattle Chamber Singers and the Contemporary Group. He has also performed with the Northwest Chamber Orchestra. He is presently tenor soloist at the University Unitarian Church. Jerry is a top computer programmer systems person for the Honeywell Corporation.

Deanna Shallenberger received a music degree at University of California in Berkely. She has studied with Mary Groom Jones. Deanna has done extensive solo work with the Chamber Singers in the past and has appeared with the NWCO.

Regen Shakarian is a graduate student in composition at the University of Washington. He has sung in many places throughout Seattle and has performed several solo recitals. In addition to being a singer and composer, Roupen is also an accomplished conductor.

Margaret Russell Van Zandt has been studying with Leon Lishner at the U of W. She is presently alto soloist at St. Stephens and has done solos with many small ensembles in Seattle. She has just recently done a duet recital with Carol Sams.

Carol Sams studied with Marni Nixon in Seattle. She is the first woman to receive a Doctorate in Composition from the University Of Washington. She has performed numerous solo and duet recitals in the area, as well as having many of her compositions performed.

<u>Valerie Yockey</u> has studied with Leon Lishner and Adele Addison of New York. Her numerous Seattle appearances have included guest spots with the NWCO and the Kronos String Quartet as well as the Seattle Chamber Singers.

What is happening to Seattle Chamber Singers??

Eight years ago George Shangrow began conducting a young madrigal group called the Seattle Chamber Singers. Since that time the group has grown to include the performance of a wide spectrum of chamber music both vocal and rumental. Over the years the growing audiences have been enthusiastic at the critics delighted. As Seattle Chamber Singers grew so did its need for first-rate instrumentalists and trained vocalists not just to sing the solos but also to comprise a chorus with the responsiveness and technical capabilities normally associated only with instrumental consorts.

During these years Seattle Chamber Singers grew as the cities' musical arts blossomed. More and more of our performers were able to become professional musicians and were becoming unable to donate consistently the time required for Chamber Singers to conduct a subscription season. A healthy audience support of the group allowed the entire production to be operated on admission revenues alone as long as most of the performers and director were donating their talents.

The cancellation of the 1975-76 season marked the economic turning point when revenues were no longer sufficient to support the musicians and thus retain the quality of performance that Seattle Chamber Singers represented. This concert season began with a fine program of Baroque vocal and orchestral music at the Seattle Center Playhouse. Already a revenue deficit was appearing.

The Second Shepherds' Pageant, the traditional Christmas presentation, usually served as the primary source of annual income. Then a succession of production problems arose with an unexpectedness that finally outnumbered the solutions. The show was cancelled and it was a dark Christmas for Seattle Chamber Singers. With the major source of revenue gone and some debts already incurred, the sad decision was inevitable: cancel the entire season rather trisk debt far beyond projected revenues.

When the dust settled it was found that Seattle Chamber Singers had spent too much time making music and too little building a business organization. This special benefit concert of Handel's <u>Israel in Egypt</u> was scheduled to attempt to clear past debts and start afresh. Allen Furst, assistant director of the Seattle Arts Commission, renewed the vision which initiated this season and shared his experience in advice to the organization officers on how to create a solvent business organization and a potential professional music group. Our efforts and enthusiasm are directed toward the establishment of the Seattle Chamber Singers and Chamber Orchestra as one of Seattle's finest professional musical entities. Please join us in our efforts to make this dream a reality!
